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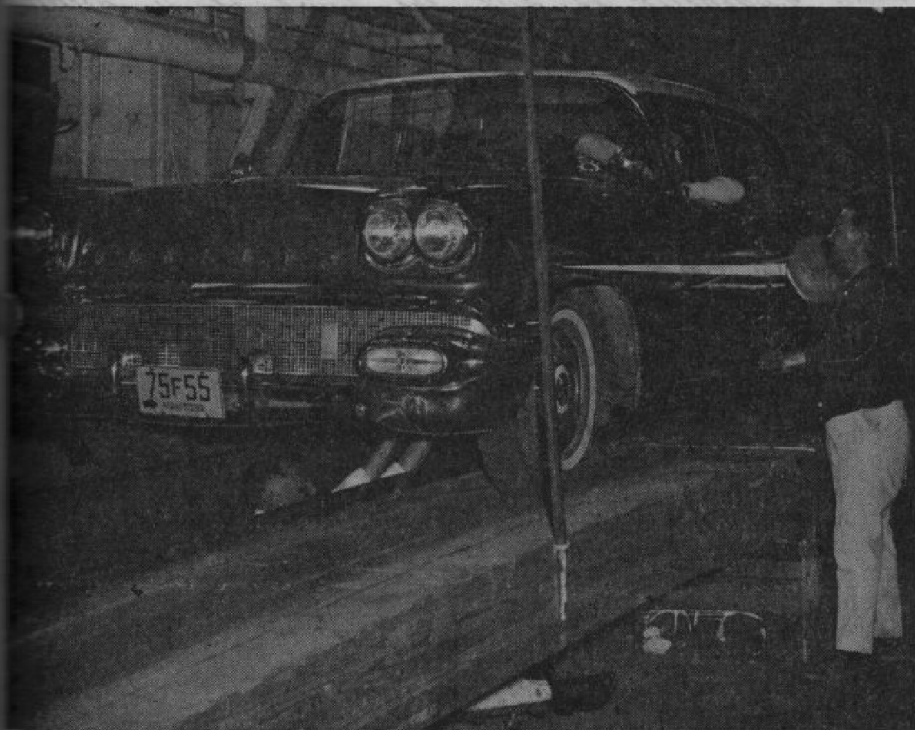

## CHECK YOUR CAR — AND YOUR SPEED



Your car has been checked . . .

### SAFE CAR CONTRIBUTES TO A PLEASANT HOLIDAY

The knowledge that a vehicle is in a safe condition could contribute largely to the pleasure of a vacation, advises the Canadian Highway Safety Council. CHSC promotes the annual summer vacation campaign, "Slow Down and Live".

A vehicle thoroughly checked in the spring may deteriorate after one or two months of steady summer driving. Hard steering could result from low or uneven tire pressure, incorrect steering lubrication, bent frame. Erratic steering when the brakes are applied will often be caused by dirt or grease on brake linings or uneven tire pressure. Worn shock absorbers might cause a car to pull to one side. Check the "shocks" for fluid leak or improper action. Tires get all the rough treatment in driving should be a major check point. Too great inflation is bad but not as bad as underinflation which, among other things, uses up more fuel. Many car owners trust their lives to defective brakes. If brakes feel wrong they should be checked thoroughly. Defective exhaust could send poisonous fumes into a car and burn more fuel.

The importance of well-functioning lights is evident to any motorist particularly those who have had headlights burn out at night. Headlights that dim when the engine is idling or shut off may indicate a partly discharged battery or a faulty beam unit. If headlights flicker, loose connections, damaged wiring or a short circuit through damaged insulation may be the cause. Turn signals that burn steadily or flash too fast usually indicate a burned-out bulb. Wiper blades that are hard or "dead" will not clean windshields properly and could create anxious moments in a sudden downpour. A blade that comes off in operation exposes the metal arm which could score the glass.

Rear-view mirrors are necessary to safe motoring, but they, like any of the vehicle's equipment must be used. Keep them properly focussed and look through them regularly, especially when changing lanes. The Canadian Highway Safety Council can cite thousands of cases where lives have been saved and injury drastically reduced by the proper use of seat belts. Wear them every moment the car is in motion. Fit them snugly over the pelvic region.

Keep the car in top condition at all times. It pays off in comfort, relaxation, pleasure and, eventually, trade-in value.

### DIARY OF A CAUTIOUS MAN

(The following is based on an actual episode related to us by an acquaintance.)

At 8 a.m. the car was fully loaded. Our friend and his family of wife and three kids were aboard, and off on the first day of their vacation.

At 4:38 p.m., he accidentally passed his intended exit point. To avoid further loss of time, he jammed on the brakes and backed up to correct his error. Behind him, about 200 different feet struck 200 different brake pedals and 1½ miles to the rear, among the speeding misguided missiles, a three-car collision occurred.

But they reached the motel just under the deadline at 5 p.m. By now he wanted an immediate shower, so he asked his wife to get his shower slippers out of the car for him. When the good wife demurred and asked why he couldn't take the shower without them, he replied sharply:

#### HYPNOSIS AND HEALTH

In a program subtitled Tricks or Treatment, Camera West takes a look at the subject of hypnosis, its present-day uses and abuses. The half-hour documentary will be telecast on the CBC-TV summer series, produced in Vancouver, on Wednesday, August 19.

Although more formal research has been undertaken on hypnosis in the past decade than in the preceding 200 years, there is still much misunderstanding of the subject among the general public. Camera West talks to some practitioners of the art in its many varieties, and explores its practices whether for treatment (as in psychiatric and childbirth cases) or tricks (as in the field of entertainment).

Among those interviewed on the program are Dr. Norman B. Hirt, a Vancouver psychiatrist who also served as general consultant for this Camera West program; Dr. Ralph I. Yorsh, a Vancouver dentist who uses hypnosis as a relaxing technique on his patients; Dr. Jafes D. Fletcher, who practices hypnosis in childbirth cases; John Hughes, who bills himself as "the greatest stage hypnotist in America"; and Mrs. Alisen P. Carter, a non-medical practitioner.

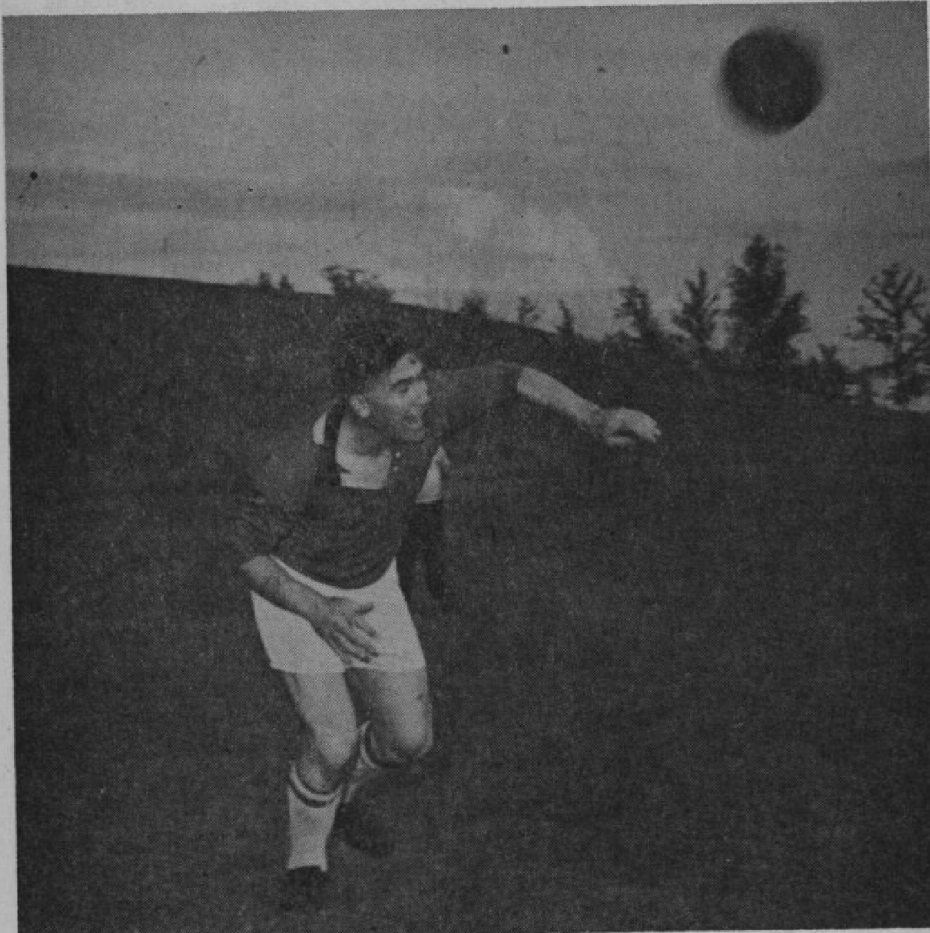
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# SOCCER NEWS

years experience as a football referee to the analysis and color commentary portion of the CFL telecasts.

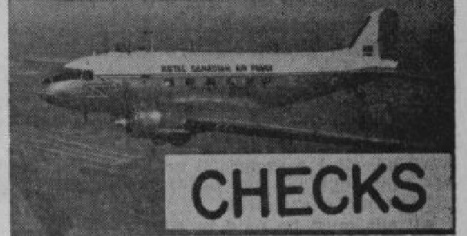
The 42-year-old CBC Toronto sportscaster officiated in the Inter-collegiate league, the ORFU, and the Big Four. Sgambati finds this background quite helpful in spotting the plays as they develop.

Sgambati also believes that hard work is necessary to get professional results. "The research involved with sports," says Fred, "is a job in itself. You have to know the players, how they compare with other players, the time and dates of their various achievements, and personal information that may give an insight into their performance."

Among Sgambati's broadcasting credits are four Grey Cup games, the World Hockey Championships in Sweden, the Canadian Open, and CBC wrestling and bowling series.

The Aug. 8 CFL game will be carried on CBC's full television network with blackouts in Toronto, Barrie and London.

#### RCAF IN EUROPE ON WAR BASIS

KINGSTON—Much of the information surrounding Canada's NATO air force is classified. That is it is not to be released. However, the recent announcement in the House by defence minister Paul Hellyer that the RCAF was operational in Europe was the first to be made by a NATO member. It is known that the United States is operational and that others are at the same stage. Operational, to air force personnel, means that Canada's six squadrons of faster-than sound jet fighters are equipped and ready to deliver nuclear weapons at a tactical target. From their bases in Germany Canada's fighters are 8-10 minutes from the iron curtain dividing East and West Germany. With a range of 400 miles this enables starfighter pilots to reach possible targets and return to their home base.

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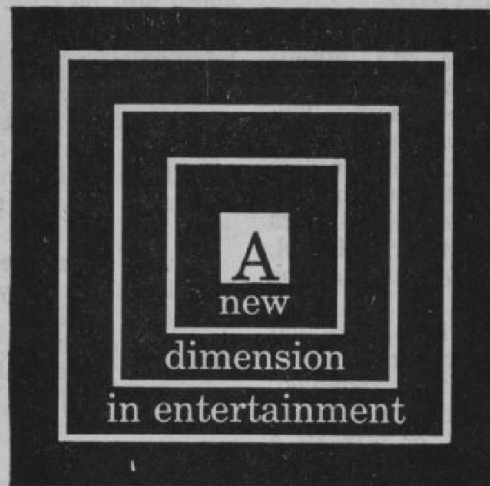
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
