

McLEOD VC MEMORIAL



Alan Arnett MacLeod V.C. R.A.F. 1918

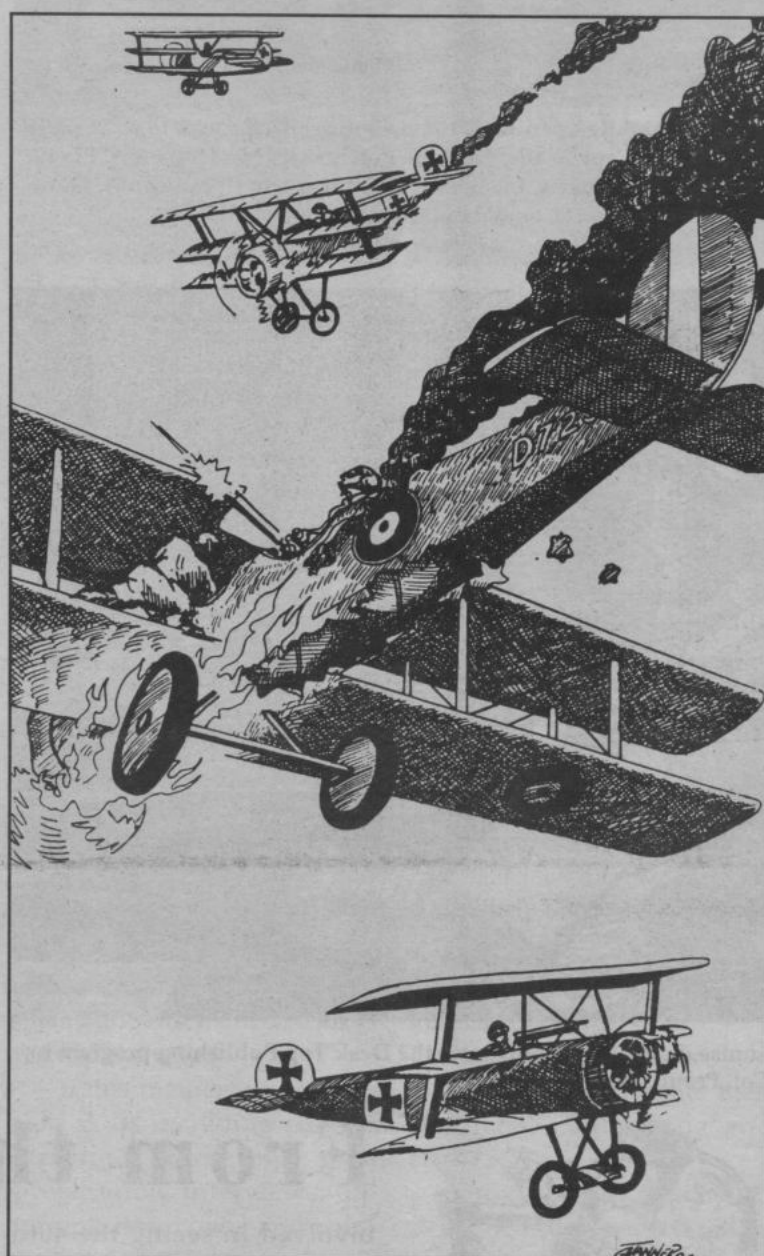
Alan Arnett McLeod was born in the small town of Stonewall, Manitoba on 20 April 1899. Educated locally, he demonstrated a profound interest in the military from a very early age. In June of 1913 he lied about his age and joined the Fort Garry Horse for their annual summer training. When his true age was discovered, young Alan was returned to school. Once the Great War began he attempted to enlist several times but was repeatedly informed that he must meet the minimum age requirements. Undaunted he continued to apply for pilot training with the Royal Flying Corps and finally, on 23 April 1917, just three days after his eighteenth birthday, he was accepted and enlisted in Toronto.

McLeod completed his basic flying training at Long Branch and Camp Borden, and received his RFC wings on 31 July 1917. Operational training in England followed and he was posted to 2 Squadron in France in late November. The squadron was equipped with Armstrong Whitworth FK8 aircraft. The "ACK-W", as it was affectionately known, was a relatively slow and cumbersome two-seater bomber/reconnaissance biplane.

The following citation details McLeod's engagement with eight Fokker Triplanes. All enemy fighter aircraft were elements of the feared "Flying Circus" commanded by Manfred Von Richtofen.

Second-Lieutenant Alan Arnett McLeod

"Whilst flying with his observer (Lieutenant A.W. Hammond, M.C.) attacking hostile formations by bombs and machine-gun fire, he was assailed at a height of five thousand feet by eight enemy triplanes which dived at him from all directions firing from their front guns. By skillful maneuvering, he enabled his observer to fire bursts at each machine in turn, shooting three of them down out of control. By this time, Lieutenant



McLeod had received five wounds and whilst continuing the engagement, a bullet penetrated his petrol tank and set the machine on fire. He then climbed out onto the left bottom plane, controlling his machine from the side of the fuselage and by side-slipping steeply, kept the plane to one side thus enabling the observer to continue firing until the ground was reached. The observer had been wounded six times when the machine crashed in 'No-Man's' land and Second-Lieutenant McLeod, notwithstanding his own wounds, dragged him away from the burning wreckage at great personal risk from heavy machine-gun fire from the enemy lines. This very gallant pilot was again wounded by a bomb whilst engaged in this act of rescue but he persevered until he had placed Lieutenant Hammond in com-

parative safety before falling himself from exhaustion and loss of blood."

Alan Arnett McLeod was Canada's youngest Victoria Cross winner of the First World War and the youngest VC of the Air. Still recovering from his wounds, he received the award from the King during a special investiture at Buckingham Palace in September 1918. He returned to Canada later that month to recuperate. Tragically he contracted the influenza that swept across Canada during that time, and due to his weakened condition passed away on 6 November 1918. It was just five days before the Armistice was signed. He is buried in Winnipeg's Kildonan Cemetery.

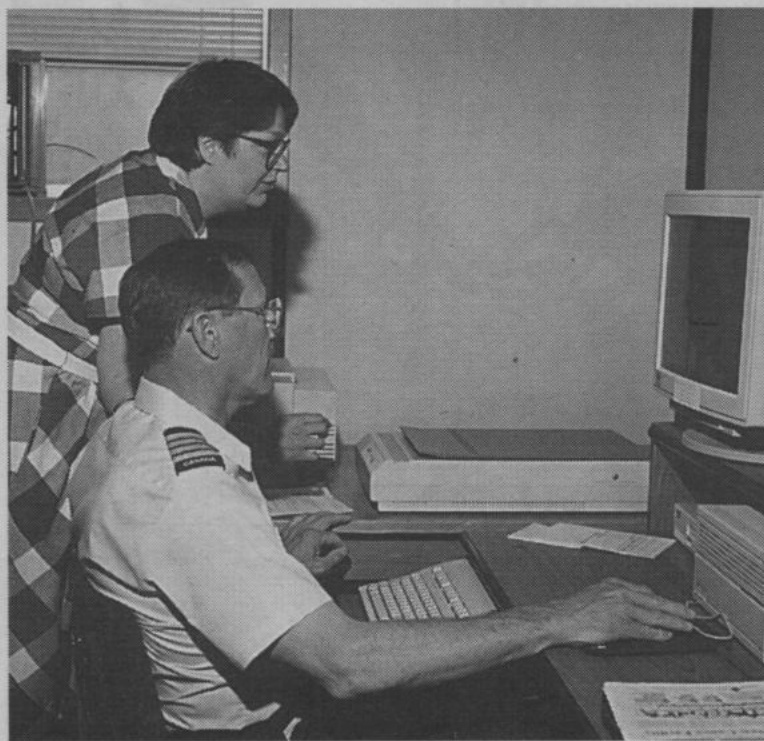

- Artwork must be as clear as possible. Originals are preferred, maximum size 8 1/2" x 11"; and

- Submissions can be on 3 1/2" disk in Macintosh or IBM format.

By following the above guidelines the workload of our volunteer staff will be cut considerably.

The emotion levels in these 12-songs are on a par with his critically acclaimed Spanish Train. He opens with the haunting opus of Dallas and beyond. Opening with the sweet sounds of Joy and moving through the snap of Take Me Higher and the horn-laced Storm, Soul II Soul have put together a 10-song outing de-

signed to keep you dancing.

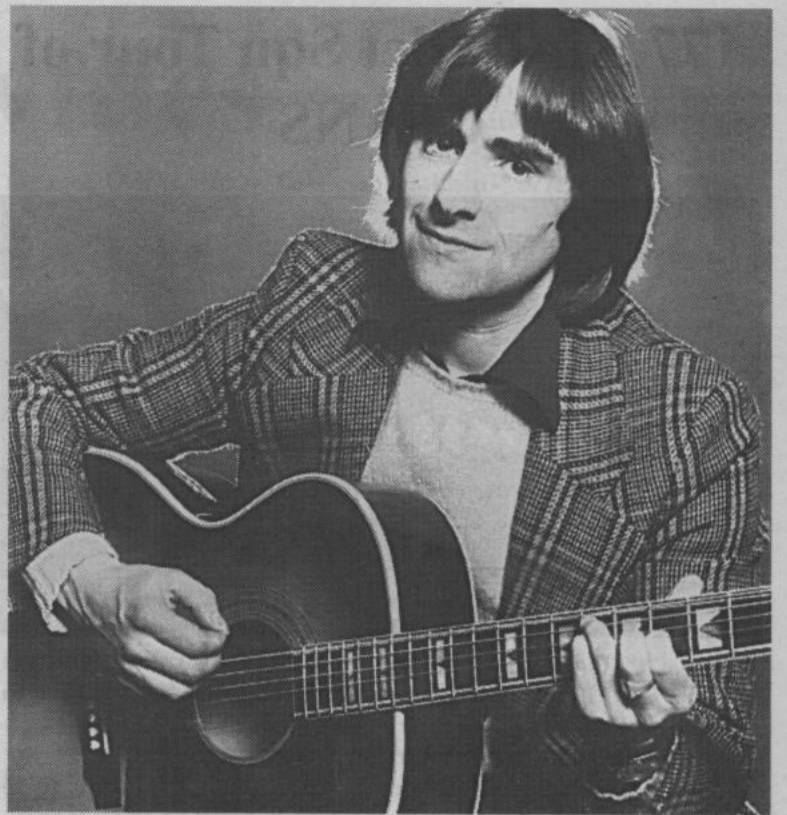
Highlights include Intelligence, Future and the set-closing Everywhere. Good grooves.

FRP SCAN

Selecting an Outplacement Agency

The Forces Reduction Program (FRP) is in full swing and Base Personnel Selection Officers (BPSOs) are busy helping CF Members through extended Second Career Assistance Network (SCAN) Programs. To assist in provision of a full range of SCAN Services, NDHQ has allowed BPSOs to authorize applications for civilian outplacement agency services. Eligible FRP personnel can request reimbursement of up to \$2,000.00 for civilian outplacement services.

What is outplacement?

Outplacement is a service that is normally provided by an employer to assist an employee in making a career transition. This service goes beyond the preparation of a resumé and termination benefits counselling. Outplacement is a well-tried and tested consultancy process which enhances military training and SCAN services with professional counselling and workshops. It recognizes that mili-

tary members and their spouses have individual needs and aspirations which cannot be met by training alone. The outplacement process is designed to help you:

- Identify your transferable skills;
- relate your military experience and achievements to the needs of a civilian employer;
- understand the civilian job market;
- identify and assess the many career options which are open to you;
- establish a clearly-defined career objective;
- prepare a resumé in civilian terms which will serve as your principle marketing tool;
- draw up and implement a personal action plan;
- communicate your strengths and market yourself successfully.

Most civilian outplacement

agencies can provide some of the components of the outplacement process. So the question is, how do you pick one over another? Here are some tips.

Select an agency which:

- has a cross country and international network of offices;
- is highly experienced in helping military personnel and employs ex-military personnel;
- offers seminars and sound individual training through one-on-one counselling;
- has only one focus - outplacement. (i.e. they are not in recruiting or just resumé writing.);
- sees you as the client. (i.e. they work for you, your concerns, your issues.);

 - 10 or more hour-long private counselling sessions;
 - practice interviews with video recording;
 - professional manuals, workbooks (not just photocopies of someone else's work)
 - video and audio tapes;
 - permits you to get help from more than one counselor or consultant through a team approach;

- offers spousal involvement at no extra charge;
- has no "hidden costs";
- asks you to evaluate their seminars, counselling and staff;
- provides full service offices including secretarial or typing services, fax, resource centre, support staff etc.

Eligible FRP personnel who make the right choice will learn how to determine what options and alternatives are available. More importantly, they will have an opportunity to learn proven techniques to help find the right job quickly.

To make the most of a great opportunity, start checking out the outplacement firms that can provide you the service you need to make a successful career transition.

177 Air Cadet Sqn Tour of CFANS

The cadets from 177 Air Canada Squadron were given a tour of the Canadian Forces Navigation School in March 1992. The tour was broken into two parts; ground school and static display of the aircraft.

Six CF naval officers to serve in Cambodia

Five navy lieutenants and their team leader, LCdr Doug Thomas, are the most recent Canadian Forces members to join the United Nations Transitional Authority in Cambodia (UNTAC).

"We will be part of a 376-member UN naval presence made up of personnel from other countries" said LCdr Doug Thomas, a MARS (maritime surface and sub-surface) officer from the Seamanship Division Command at the Fleet School in Halifax. "We

will be working with the navies of about six other UN countries to set up patrols along the coast and up the rivers as force observers."

He and the five lieutenants from across Maritime Command were told they were going to Southeast Asia three weeks before their early May departure from Canada to the Cambodian capital of Phnom Penh. All of the men had volunteered for UN duty, but as Lt(N) Gerry White explained, none of them imagined the myriad inoculations they would have to receive before leaving Canada.

"We've had about 17 needles, including those for rabies and the plague," smiled Lt(N) White, Tilley hat in hand, ready for his six-month tour of duty.

Some 80 members of the Canadian Forces left Canada in mid April for duty in Cam-

bodia, most from 5e Brigade Mécanisée du Canada, CFB Valcartier, Que. Twenty more Canadian Forces personnel were already in Cambodia and another 103 are expected to deploy by the end of May.

UNTAC will be the largest UN mission since Korea with a multinational force of up to 16,000 peacekeepers. The mandate of the mission will include the supervision, monitoring and verification of the ceasefire, and the withdrawal of foreign forces. The peacekeepers will also supervise next year's landmark election for a new government in Cambodia.

Capt. McDonald regularly contributes articles on a variety of subjects to Canadian Forces base and station newspapers from ND-HQ in Ottawa.

The museum provided refreshments and also had a huge model of a "Dambuster" Lancaster hanging over a display of Bob Kellow's mementos which even included the handle of the parachute he used to land in Northern Holland. In addition to the special display, Jan and Danny Connon continuously ran a CBC video of an interview with Bob Kellow made in 1980 which had scenes from the Dambuster movie inter-

persed as Bob described his recollections of the Dams Raid. In addition there was soft background music of the Dambusters' March, the Air Force March, Waltzing Matilda and other wartime music. All in all it was a most successful book launch that appeared to be enjoyed by all in attendance.

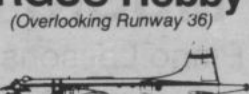

Locally, Capt Steve Feyes took his instructional techniques to the St. James-Assiniboia School Division to teach 25 Grade 8 students the principles of rocketry and rocket construction in their first annual Space Camp. Did they fire any at you, Steve?

The Electronic Warfare (EW) staff has also been busy

with courses and visits. Recently the staff attended the Association of Old Crows in Ottawa, and Maj Steve Sakaluk briefed 150 NDHQ and civilian personnel on the nature of EW training in the CF. The Winnipeg flight line should have some interesting visitors in the next couple of weeks since an EC130, EA6B, F4G Wild Weasel, and an EFill are expected to arrive in support of the last EW course before summer.

So June promises to be another exciting month at CFSAS, and we hope many of you will be interested in joining us at the annual symposium.

CFSAS : Air Force Staff Course

Since the organization of the Canadian Forces School of Aerospace Studies (CFSAS) in 1987, our primary orientation has been highly technical, as we conduct aerospace systems, electronic warfare and space orientation courses. However, in January of this year, the Commander Air Command directed the School to embark on a new training adventure; that of conducting the Air Force Staff Course (AFSC). This new course is designed to fill a gap in the professional development of Air Force junior officers. The provisional Course Training Standard has been written and approved and we are now tasked to conduct a trial course in November/December 1992.

The need for this type of course is not new. Over the years various organizations have commented on Air Force officer development. At the Canadian Forces Staff College it was observed that Air Force officers were generally not familiar with the overall Air Force operation, whereas Army and Navy officers were fully conversant with their aims. Air Force officers also tended to be less experienced in leadership and personnel management issues.

Some of these deficiencies should not come as a surprise. For example, whereas an Army officer is trained in leadership skills and is given ever-increasing war-related leadership roles throughout his initial years of service,

many Air Force Officers - especially aircrew may not have any significant personnel management role until they achieve the rank of Major. Also, the various Air Force groups tend to operate either as separate entities (such as Air Transport and Fighter-Groups), or as arms of the Army (10 TAG) or Navy (MAG). Therefore, there is little operational need for officers of one group to have any significant knowledge of another's organization and roles. While this condition may not be a severe handicap to the officer in his normal routine, it can become a problem when posted to a staff position where a broader knowledge is required, or when promoted to a position where "big picture" appreciation and leadership skills are essential to mission accomplishment.

The way in which the AFSC aims to meet this challenge is to address personnel leadership, the conduct of all types of Air Force operations, and the nature and availability of support services. For leadership, the officer will learn more about factors which affect flight and general safety, ethics, laws of armed conflict and the fostering of esprit de corps. On the operations side he will be introduced to the air doctrines which govern all types of air warfare and the ways in which various types of Air Forces are organized. The principles of Command and Control and security will also be covered.

On the support end, the of-

ficer will be made aware of how the various support organizations are structured, what kinds of support are available and how to go about getting it. They will learn the whole range of documentation from establishment change proposals (ECP) and Materiel Authorization Change Requests (MACR) to Statements of Capability Deficiency and Air appreciations. The aim of this is not to teach them to write, but to understand the processes involved in getting an operational task done by using the resources and support systems in the ways they were intended. If all goes well, none of this training will be duplicated in other training. While we plan to build on the basis of the Air Force Indoctrination Course and some BOTC training, we will not duplicate the OPDP, Staff School and Electronic Warfare courses.

To meet the goal of having the first trial course this year, the School has formed an implementation team led by the Chief Instructor, Major Melissen. The Training Support Flight Commander, Captain Mike Hale, will be primarily concerned with acquiring the necessary accommodations, supplies and equipment. The Admin O, Captain Al Gouthro will be responsible for the hiring of temporary staff, organizing a soon-to-be-formed orderly room, and for budget formation. In early April, Mr. Dave Mitchell was hired for one year to assist in developing the Course Training Plan, organizing the

course schedule and organizing the training prior to the arrival of permanent instructional staff this summer.

The permanent instructional staff for the AFSC will consist of six Staff College graduate Majors. In addition, we will make liberal use of guest lecturers from Air Command and the various group headquarters, and possibly also from some local universities and industry. Tours, if any, will likely be limited to a visit to the Western Canada Aviation Museum for a sense of aviation history, to AIRCOM Headquarters for an operations overview and to one or two local industries to see how the Air Force depends on industry for some of its support.

Looking to the future, our schedule is very tight. Although the staff won't arrive until August, the initial course this fall will start on 2 Nov with 20 students. Following its completion in mid December,

we will have about 3 months to review the Course Training Standard, revise the Course Training Plan and amend the individual training sessions in time for the steady-state courses. These will commence in April 1993, with six courses per year, and 30 students per course. Many of these plans have a number of problems associated with them. These include the lack of space in our current facility. So, don't be surprised if you see some new ATCO-type trailers in the vicinity of Mawdesley Hall in the future. Even then, we'll be trying to accommodate more staff in the present amount of office space, so some of our staff may appear to be a bit claustrophobic at times.

As a School, we really do look forward to this new challenge. It is an opportunity to begin a whole new dimension of Air Force officer development. We aim to continue to achieve the CFSAS motto of "strength through knowledge".

Academic Reimbursement

Over the years the Base Training Office has seen many service personnel come through its doors seeking answers to questions on education and training, but the most common question dealt with the reimbursement of tuition fees for educational upgrading.

Educational upgrading is a process whereby a member improves his/her educational qualifications. It includes:

- a. secondary education;
- b. post secondary education at a university;
- c. post secondary education at a community college provided that the credits received in a college program in whole or in part have the capability

of being accepted as credit(s) in a university degree or diploma granting program; and

d. post secondary education leading to a professional designation such as CMA or CGA.

Who is eligible? All members of the Regular force are eligible for reimbursement under this program except:

- a. members attending a full-time subsidized program of academic study;
- b. members on leave without pay;
- c. members whose courses will extend beyond the completion date of their terminal leave; and
- d. members subject to forfei-

ture of pay and allowances. During the month of June marks will be mailed from most educational institutions to all students. If you are eligible, your course meets the requirements listed above and you have successfully completed your course, please come and see us at B Trg within the next 60 days.

Documentation required:

- a. one photocopy of your marks showing successful completion;
- b. one photocopy of your tuition receipt;
- c. original cash register tape for textbooks purchased for your course; and
- d. a list of mandatory textbooks that were required for your course.

After signing the necessary forms, all documentation is mailed to NDHQ for further action and within the next two months you will receive notification of the amount of reimbursement. Your courses may be reimbursed up to \$225.00

or 50%, whichever is greater in any one academic year. The annual entitlement is based on the academic year in which the course or training commenced.

Finally, the entitlement will not be sent directly to you, but will be added to your next pay, less income tax. Sorry!

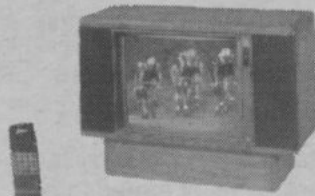

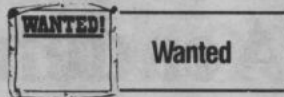
