



This article is the second of a two part series on the Base Construction Engineering Section. Part I, Getting To Know CE, described, in general terms, what CE's role is and what resources it has to fulfil the demands placed on it. As well, a brief description was covered on the types of work CE deals with on a day to day basis. The purpose of this second part of the series is to give building occupants a better understanding of work request (project) flow, how to prepare work requests, and finally some do's and don'ts to keep in mind when requesting CE work.



The Military Police Section has many responsibilities, one of which you may be most concerned with is our areas of patrols. Many patrols are conducted of all areas of both portions of the Base, that is CFB Winnipeg North (Westwin) and CFB Winnipeg South (Kapyong Barracks) including the PMQ areas. We are also responsible for

CE - How It Works and How It Can Work For You

Communication between CE and the user unit begins with the submission of a CF 141 (Work Request). The process from then on is sometimes a mystery to those outside of CE and merits some explanation. The chart at Fig 1 is intended to describe the flow of a typical project once the request is received by CE.

There are two items worthy of note in the flow chart. First, you will notice that there are several decision points which involve funds or scheduling of other CE resources, such as engineering design time.

The second point worthy of note in the flow chart is that during the planning and implementation of a project there is always a requirement for communication between CE and the user unit. It is important that units have a good understanding of who does what in CE and consequently whom to talk to about various problems. To assist you in this regard, a CE Organization Charts is offered at Fig 2.

When spelling out the requirement on a CF 141, it is important to give as much information as possible, showing locations and dimensions. Justification on CF 141's must also be well written and complete so the request can be realistically assessed as essential, necessary, or desirable.

Finally, work requests should detail all of the work necessary. It is tempting at times for units to state a bare minimum on the CF 141 and enlarge the job to its real proportion when the tradesmen appear on the job. This merely results in delays, costs money and could result in the project being cancelled because of unforeseen costs. If in doubt, users are encouraged to call the CE Requirements Officer or the Planning Officer who will be happy to assist by advising on the proper procedures to follow when submitting work requests.

The following is a suggested list of DO's and DON'Ts for units to keep in mind when requesting CE work:

a. DO be specific. The more detail you provide, the fewer questions we have and the job is processed that much faster;

b. DON'T try to design a job yourself. Drawings and specifications will be drawn up by CE professionals in consultation with unit representatives;

c. DON'T use one word justifications. Make them meaningful and accurate so they will sell your requirement.

d. DO phone the CE Works Control at local 5207 for project status reports;

e. DO remember work order numbers given to you. It will help when investigating the status of your work request;

f. DO cancel a request and submit a new one as soon as you realize your needs have changed;

g. DON'T wait until tradesmen appear on the job to change your mind about the work requested;

h. DON'T write letters and memoranda to CE requesting work without attaching a typed CF 141 (CE Work Request); and

j. DO remember that CE is here to serve you. If you need help or advice setting up a work request, ask and thou shalt receive.

If this article has had one underlying theme it is that communication between CE and the user is necessary if work is to be performed to everyone's satisfaction. The elements of a good communication system are as follows:

a. good understanding by CE, when designing projects, of the unit requirements;

b. good understanding by the units when requesting projects, of CE organization and the constraints under which CE operates; and

c. a feedback system whereby CE is informed if the customer is satisfied with the work performed.

The BCEO and his staff hope this series of articles has helped to clear away some of the mystery behind your friendly Construction Engineering Section.

tions of the base however any incidents occurring within the 2PPCLI lines (Kapyong Barracks) are actioned by the Batallion MP/RP Section.

The Military Police have jurisdiction over all DND property including the PMQ areas however the streets in the PMQ areas are city property therefore Winnipeg City Police have jurisdiction on the streets.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH PROGRAM

Neighbourhood Watch is the noting and reporting of suspicious activity in YOUR NEIGH-BOURHOOD. Police Officers

patrolling on your street do not know who belongs there and who does not. Most people in a typical neighbourhood know what their neighbours look like and what vehicles they drive, even if they do not converse with each other on a daily basis.

The program emphasizes that neighbours should take note of strangers in the area whether it is the suspicious auto cruising the area looking for a house to break in, or a teenager "cutting" through your yard because he parked his car on the next street

and will break into a house on your street, or that door-to-door salesperson who may actually be someone going to every house on your block to find out who is not at home.

In order to start the program and in order for it to be effective we will need a maximum of support. If you are interested please complete the form and Mail it to the Military Police Section, CFB Winnipeg or drop it off at the Military Police Section ATTN: NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH PROGRAM.







Edmonton in the other semi final.


The final game between CFB Moose Jaw and CFB Cold Lake was very entertaining.

comes a present reality for the spouses left behind to "soldier on" without the comfort and support of their mate.

It's at times like these that our communication effort can be stressful and confused. An article I read recently suggested how important it was to talk it out, to share the feelings one has with his/her partner. Attempts to bottle-up and hide our emotions often backfire and are destructful and harming to our relationship, and our physical, emotional and spiritual well-being. We're not meant to carry our burdens alone and just knowing that someone is aware of our stress, hurt feelings, worries and difficult decisions and cares about us can mean a great deal. Having a close friend of the same sex is another way of coping with the stress of making it alone as a mate and as a parent. For years it has been known that those persons who weather a crisis well are not ashamed to express their fears, anxieties and sorrow, are eager to explore possible solutions with others and are able to enlist and to accept the help of others. The "good copers" consider talking it out and asking for help a sign of strength and maturity rather

Christians have learned over the centuries that spiritual and emotional well-being is dependent upon having a healthy and mature relationship to God. In times of stress, marital, parental, or financial, God is a constant source of strength, available to support, encourage and sustain through the deepest periods of anxiety and confusion.

As well as talking out our problems, it's necessary to develop our listening skills. Most of us are poor listeners, we want to jump in with the solution or respond with pious platitudes to people's problems. We need to just listen, to let our partner talk, yell or cry. Advising, analyzing, or judging by saying things like "Don't get so emotional", or "Try to get it together, will you!" or 'Snap out of it" aren't very help-

Often the stress and pain of the situation can be relieved by having someone listen to us without interruption, correction and making pre-judgments. Listening with openness, vulnerability and sensitivity has defused countless potential "powder-kegs". So, don't underestimate the value of "just listening". Listening is perhaps the most important communication tool we possess.

It's comforting to know that we can go to God at any time and know He'll listen openly, with acceptance and concern to all we wish to share. No pre-judgments, condemnation or harsh criticism. Having a God like that lifts much stress and worry from our shoulders. As Jesus said to all who were burdened down by the cares of life.

"Come to me, all of you who are tired of carrying heavy loads, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke and put it on, and learn from me, because I am gentle and humble in spirit, and you will find



Oily Rag

Accidents, Injury and Autopac

With winter now upon us, driving becomes more treacherous and motor vehicle accidents more frequent. Amid the pain and suffering associated with any personal injury which may result, it is important that one is reassured that compensation will be forthcoming when dealing with the Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation or Autopac as it is commonly known. It should also be noted that the statements made herein relate to the most common situations involved. For further information, it is suggested that you consult legal counsel.

If you are seriously hurt in an accident and require hospitalization you should be contacted by an adjuster for Autopac to further the claim that you will be making. Should such not be the case, you should contact the Bodily Injury Claim Centre of Autopac to arrange for an appointment to meet with an adjuster. At that time, the adjuster will have you complete an Accident Benefits Application form and assist you in making a statement in relation to the accident in question. Keep in mind that at all times in relation to such dealings with Autopac you are entitled to have legal counsel present.

Regardless of whether you are responsible for the accident in which you were involved, you are still entitled to disability benefits. Such benefits include partial compensation for lost income. For this purpose the adjuster will require confirmation as to your usual earnings from employment and a doctor's report.

Various types of disability benefits are available. First, you will be reimbursed for medical expenses, dental expenses, ambulance charges, chiropractic expenses, prescriptions, and other related expenses up to a specified limit. In addition, if, as a result of the injuries suffered, you have become incapable of continued engagement in your former employment, payment may be made for any necessary occupational rehabilitation training. Second, where loss of life has resulted from the injury, your executor or personal representative will be paid for the actual cost of funeral and burial services to a maximum of \$1,500.00. Third, again in the situation where loss of life results, a death benefit is payable

to your dependants with the amount of such benefit varying depending upon the dependant's relationship to you. Fourth, benefits are payable to you to partially indemnify you for lost income or for a loss of your ability to perform your trade, calling,

or home duties.

For all but 7 days following the date of the accident, you may be reimbursed for periods during which you are totally disabled or partially disabled as defined in the Regulation and determined by the attending medical practitioner. Benefits payable for total disability range from \$150.00 to \$300.00 per week depending upon your employment earnings during the 6 months immediately preceding the accident. Benefits payable for partial disability are in the amount of \$60.00 per week. This type of benefit is also payable to a person who manages and controls a household and who is not otherwise employed.

Finally, the disability benefits payable include impairment benefits payable for the permanent loss of a bodily function whether such loss is either total or partial. The benefit payable depends upon the degree of impairment and is determined pursuant to a schedule attached to the Regulation and is to a maximum of \$20,000.00 for total impair-

It is important to note when considering this type of benefit that other than the above indicated reimbursement for funeral expenses and payment of a death benefit, no benefits are payable either to a person who is driving without legal authority or while disqualified. Such is also true in relation to a person who was a passenger of such a driver unless the person upon reasonable and probable grounds believed that the driver was qualified and authorized.

In addition, the Regulation includes various conditions which may disqualify an individual from receiving benefits of this nature. Finally, while many of the criteria are subject to the opinion of the attending medical practitioner, Autopac is entitled, where there is a dispute as to the injuries suffered, to subject the individual to an examination by a qualified medical practitioner that it

may appoint.

If you were either the driver of a motor vehicle who was not totally responsible for the accident in question, a passenger in a motor vehicle involved in an accident, or a pedestrian involved in an accident, additional benefits are payable by Autopac as the insurer of the individual responsible for the accident. Pursuant to such coverage, if you have suffered loss or damage as a result of the accident, Autopac will pay to you the amount of such loss or damage which legal liability would otherwise prescribe. A portion of such amount is payable where responsibility for the accident partly falls upon the claimant. Most important under this heading of recovery is a lump sum settlement from Autopac as compensation for pain, suffering, and the loss of enjoyment of life.

The amount of such compensation is determined by, generally speaking, the seriousness of the injury and the length of time it takes for you to fully recover. The only means by which such can be assessed is to compare the seriousness of the injury relating to the individual in the case in question to previous court decisions relating to injuries of a similar nature. Such is often the reason why legal counsel is consulted in such a situation. In addition, if you are generally an active person and therefore if the injuries have greatly disrupted your lifestyle, you should be better compensated than if you are usually involved in sedentary pursuits. It is also important to note that any disability benefits received by an individual are deducted from the total amount which is otherwise received.

In summary, when dealing with the Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation in relation to the settlement of compensation to be received as a result of a motor vehicle accident, it is important to be aware of all of the possible benefits that you may be entitled to. Hopefully this outline of such benefits will serve to increase any benefits that you may otherwise receive.






