
Six officers of the Royal Danish Air Force were weekend visitors to RCAF Training Command Headquarters here.

EDITORIAL CORNER

Water Safety Week

Next week has been set aside as Water Safety Week, and various organizations throughout Canada will sit down and take stock of what has been accomplished in the way of water safety during the past year, and what can be added to an already busy program for the coming year.

The RCAF is one organization that has "Water Safety" laid down in official policy, and stock taking of its accomplishments in water safety training is a rewarding task indeed.

The RCAF program is a composite of two programs; that of the Canadian Red Cross, and the Royal Life Saving Society. The relationship between these two societies and the RCAF is one of co-operation and mutual benefit to all parties. The two societies have been most generous with their assistance to the RCAF's program since its inception in 1959. They have a high regard for the knowledge and ability of RCAF personnel involved in the program's operation and for that reason have, after careful selection and training, appointed fourteen RCAF personnel to the exclusive status of Water Safety Supervisor. Those appointed as such are qualified to train instructors and give the examinations. There are, however, many volunteers who devote many hours of their off-duty time and effort to supervise over pool activities.

There are 53 indoor and outdoor pools at RCAF establishments, and these are often the scene of competitions involving clubs and schools from neighbouring communities. These pool activities are worthy indeed, for at one RCAF station last year, every person over the age of four could swim.

To embark on such an active program, many instructors and supervisors are required. At last report 237 RCAF personnel have qualified as Water Safety Instructors. In addition to service personnel, 70 dependents had qualified to instruct in the program. The total number of air force personnel and dependents who qualified at various proficiency levels is reported to be 8,167.

You could do well by taking part in the activities at the pool. By mastering the art of swimming, under the capable supervision provided, you are ensuring Physical Fitness while at the same time meeting the challenge of Water Safety. Why not give it a "Go."

THE RCAF HELPS OUT

The Canadian Press Picture Service Monthly Bulletin dated April 1963 carried this interesting item:

"RCAF's Maritime Air Command in Halifax helped CP provide fast news and picture coverage on the foundering of the former polar exploration ship "Bear", March 1963.

F/L Cy Dunbar, PRO, tipped CP that the "Bear", under tow from Halifax to Philadelphia, was adrift in heavy seas 100 miles off the southern tip of N.S.

Cpl Don Stanger, an amateur photographer aboard a search aireraft out of Greenwood, N.S. took two shots of the "Bear" and a tug standing by.

WO George Brannan of the Greenwood Photo Section processed the shots and prints were driven 100 miles to Halifax for wire-photo use less than 3½ hours after Stanger returned to base.

FAMILY WATER SAFETY

Last weeks Family Water Safety evening was extremely successful from the Instruction view point, but only 35 to 40 persons were in attendance. Unfortunately for boat owners, they missed a great deal of useful information in all aspects of boating. Mr. Bill Greenly from the Manitoba Red Cross presented films and a short lecture, the main theme or course was Boating, emphasis being placed on Government approved Equipment, e.g. Life Jackets, cushions, Light and Flag Regulations. Did You KNOW all boats must have identification numbers, and any boats 16 feet in length and under, must have a Government plate specifying Maximum size of motor to be used and maximum carrying weight. We learned about the types of Anchors, Ring bouys, Extinguishers, paddles and general demonstration of some of the equipment used around Water areas. In all, the slides gave an excellent idea of equipment being used for modern boating and water safety. Mr. Greenly displayed some of the approved jackets and with the help of Miss Debbie McInnes, a non swimmer from our Beginner classes, demonstrated a non-swimmer's peril with a jacket on. Much to her enjoyment, she had her first swim in the deep end of the pool. - A sure test of the ability and safety of Lifejackets. SO WHAT'S NEW?

By F/L J. MACDONALD

"The Flyer's Guide," printed in 1915, has some useful hints which might be of interest to present-day aicrew so a few are presented here.

Instrumentation. The flyer must have engraved on his mind the fact that a machine only flies by virtue of the speed with which it is passing through the air. If he allows that speed to be lost it will cease to fly.

The aviator is usually assisted by various instruments, but opinions differ as to the wisdom of allowing the flyer to us them. The instruments more generally fitted are:

1) Pitot Tube

- 1) The Pitot Tube which registers the airspeed of the machine but is recognized as not being dead accurate.

2) The Aneroid Barometer is, without doubt, a very useful accessory. It is harmless, as it is not a direct help to the flying of a machine. Furthermore, there is in every pilot's mind an unexplainable desire, one might say craving, to know how high he is.

3) The Inclinometer is a spirit level marked in degrees to show at what angle the machine is to the horizon in a lateral sense. As a rule they are inclined to stick, and are of little value.

4) A watch is a decided source of comfort.

5) Not necessary for aerodrome

Cross country flying. Although few pilots rely on the compass to find their way, it is of the greatest use under certain circumstances. It is always advisable to look up one's course on a map before starting off and to note down the compass bearing from point to point.

Before starting off across country, it is as well to make certain that one has enough petrol and oil in one's tanks. In addition, a certain number of tools, a sparking plug or two, some wire, etc., should be carried. The engine must be run on the ground to your entire satisfaction. It is never worthwhile commencing a flight with an engine that is not doing its best.

If the clouds are thick and numerous, one of two courses must be adopted. Either fly below them if they are sufficiently high to allow this, or, if they are very low, it will be necessary to get above them and fly entirely by compass bearing. In the latter event it is recommended that a descent being made at regular intervals (every 20 miles or so) until the earth becomes visible in order to verify one's position.

DEFENCE — AGAINST OURSELVES

It is true that we, ourselves, are our own worst enemies from a safety standpoint.

We can only DEFEND ourselves AGAINST ourselves when we RECOGNIZE ourselves for what we are.

The process of self evaluation upon which we must build our defences is something very personal. No one can examine another man's conscience nor can anyone else evaluate us as well as we can.

It is not necessary to go to a head doctor and flop on his couch to get the answers we need. Listening to a pot of pious advice is not likely to get the job done, either. Did you ever stop to think that nobody can bawl you out as well as you can yourself?

When somebody else bawls you out, you usually wind up resenting it and seeking justification for your actions. Certainly our minds tend to close up during the course of a bawling out. Often we don't even hear what's being said because we are too busy wondering where we can get another boss, or another wife, or another or whoever it is that's handing out the sass.

On the other hand, did you ever say to the guy in the shaving mirror something like this. "What a smart cookie you turned out to be. You wouldn't slow down and stop for that yellow light. No, you had to see if you could get through before it turned red. Now you have to make out an accident report, pay for a traffic ticket, tell the boss about it — lose your safe driver award for another year and try to explain it to the better half. Boy, you're really smart."

Now that's the kind of bawling out that a man really listens to. That's the kind of bawling out that rakes his hide where it hurts and, if he is at all capable of learning a lesson, he's listening to the only teacher on earth that can really dish it out.

One of the most important personal characteristics that we have is summed up in the word, "attitude."

What is our attitude towards our jobs, our families and our fellow men? Make no mistake, when we start wheeling cars with passengers over the streets and highways, we are our brother's keepers whether we think of it in that light or not.

We accept responsibility for life and property that can't be measured merely in insurance dollars.

The man who regards himself as "just a driver," who does not recognize the true value of his position in the life and commerce of his community, is not only missing a lot of inner satisfaction but is actually guilty of a kind of deliberate blindness.

Our attitute towards ourselves should be governed by one important fact. If the cars and commercial vehicles of this nation were all halted, the country would grind to a total and complete halt. Maintaining the flow of goods and services upon which the economic life of the country depends is our obligation. There is no group in Canadian industry more important to the national welfare than is ours.

To return to the matter of self evaluation; if we do an honest job — one motivated by an attitude that recognizes our importance in the scheme of things — we can recognize our personal defects and set about overcoming them.

The approach to self improvement must spring from a desire not to be just average, but to be better than average.

BENEVOLENT FUND'S **RECORD YEAR**

A record year for grants and loans was reported at the 20th annual meeting of the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund, held recently in Ottawa. In presenting his annual report, chairman of the board, Wing Commander D. Park Jamieson, M.B.E., Q.C., LL.D., mentioned that the misuse of consumer credit had led to financial difficulties for many peo-

Since the end of the Second World War, he said, assistance extended by the fund had increased steadily, and was accountable, to a large extent, to those who had abused their credit privilege. Inadequate sales resistance was blamed for the fact that many members of the community seemed unable to control their spending, so that the slightest unusual expense threw their planning out of kilter. In addition to being helped financially, these people had to be counselled and supervised to help them keep clear of further trouble.

Educational assistance to university and vocational students also increased during 1962, helping to equip the recipients to earn eventually a better-than-average income. Despite the increased coverage of hospital and medical insurance, the reduction in demands on the fund for these purposes has not been as great as might be expected. This, said the chairman, was largely because some people were unable to afford complete coverage, while others, through ignorance or inertia, failed to cover themselves.

At the close of 1962 the Fund totalled \$3,711,527.00, and the generous contributions of the Active Service units have helped maintain this healthy financial position. During the year, the Fund extended grants and loans to the sum of \$466,000.00, to service and exservice applicants. Settlements achieved and help obtained from other sources increased this figure to a total of nearly two-thirds of a million dollars. Of the total of 1,144 applications for help received during the year, only 55 were rejected.

The new President of the Fund is Wing Commander H. E. Langford, Q.C., of Toronto, who succeeds Air Vice Marshal FS McGill,

A director of a number of companies, W/C Langford, is President of the Chartered Trust Company, Chairman of the Board of Lucas Rotax Limited, a Past Chairman of the Board of Regents of Victoria University and a member of the Board of Directors of Queen Elizabeth Hospital. Called to the

Bar in 1928, he served in the RCAF during the Second World War. becoming Deputy Director of Marning at Air Force Headquarters.

The meeting included the annua election of officers of the Fund during which Air Vice Marsha McGill succeeded Wing Commander Park Jamieson as Chairman the Board. Air Marshal C. (Larry) Dunlap, C.B.E., succeeds Air Marshal Hugh Campbell C.B.E., C.D., LL.D., as Honorar President, and Mr. H. G. Norman C.M.G., C.A., remains Honorary Life President.


Section Commanders are to ensure that their personnel are made aware of this competition, and make an all out effort to eliminate all fire hazards and observe all fire regulations in their sections.
