




## In Remembrance






In Flanders Fields

In Handers fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly I carce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived , felt down , sow sunset glow . Loved, and were loved, and now we lie In Handers fields.

Jake up our querrel with the five: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Handers fields

Each November over fourteen million poppies bloom in Canada. Dotting the lapels of half of Canada's population, this symbol of remembrance makes its annual appearance as it has done every year since 1926.

Although everybody knows what the poppy means, no one is certain of how it all began; how the poppy became so closely associated with remembrance of the war dead.

The association was certainly not new when the poppy was adopted in Canada in 1921. At least a hundred and ten years before that time, a correspondent wrote of how thickly poppies grew over the graves of the dead. He was speaking of the days and nights the allies Napoleonic War and its campaigns in Flanders.

But a Canadian medical officer was chiefly responsible for this association, more so than any other single known factor.

John McCrae was a tall, boyish 43-year-old member of the Canadian Medical Corps from Guelph, Ontario. An artillery veteran of the Boer War, he had the eye of a gunner, the hand of a surgeon and the soul of a poet when he went into the line at Ypres on April 22, 1915.

That was the afternoon the enemy first used poison gas.

The first attack failed. So did the next and the next. For 17 repulsed wave after wave of attackers.

During this period, McCrae wrote "One can see the dead lying there on the front field. And in places where the enemy threw in an attack, they lie very thick on the slopes of the German trenches."

Working from a dressing station on the bank of the Yser Canal, Lt.-Col. McCrae dressed hundreds of wounded, never taking off his clothes for the entire 17 days. Sometimes the dead or wounded actually rolled down the bank from above into his dugout. While awaiting the arrival of batches of wounded, he would watch the men at work in the

burial plots which were quickly filling up.

Then McCrae and his unit were relieved. "We are weary in body and wearier in mind. The general impression in my mind is one of a nightmare," he wrote

But McCrae came out of Ypres with 13 lines scrawled on a scrap of paper. The lines were the poem which started: "In Flanders field the poppies blow..."

There were the lines which are enshrined in the hearts of all soldiers who heard in them their innermost thoughts. McCrae was their voice. The poem circulated as does a folk song, by living word of mouth. Men learned it with their hearts.

In the United States, the poem inspired the American Legion to adopt the poppy as the symbol of Remembrance.

In Canada the poppy was officially adopted by the Great War Veterans Association in 1921 on the suggestion of a Mrs. E. Guerin of France. But there is little doubt that the impact of McCrae's poem influenced this

The poem speaks of Flanders fields. But the subject is universal: the fear that in death we will be forgotten, that death will have been in vain.

The spirit of true Remembrance, as symbolized by the poppy, must be our eternal answer which belies those fears.

The message was handed to him and it ended there.

Quincy thought that this was awful, as I had led him to believe that a promotion to warrant officer was a major milestone for an individual, and we treated it as if it was nothing. He thought it was dreadful that we made such a big deal of a private's promotion to corporal and did nothing for a sergeant's promotion to warrant officer. I agreed. However, I tried to explain to him that I really believe that this was a result of the window letter. He concurred.

Quincy then asked me why people couldn't just get on with the job we are paying them to do, and not spend the majority of their time preoccupied with promotions and such things. He bet me that since the warrant officer had received his "letter" back in February, this subject had been uppermost in his mind until promoted in August. I had to agree with him.



down into a basic and advanced phase. The basic phase lasts for 6 months. Here students receive instruction in basic navigation procedures, aircraft electronics, meteorology and officer development. In the advanced phase each student enters either the maritime or transport stream for further training geared to that particular air group.

At present all training flights are done aboard the three Hercules aircraft of 429 Squadron in Winnipeg. Pilots and flight engineers of 429 make up the front end crew for these flights, a role to be taken over by 402 Reserve Squadron upon the arrival of the Dash 8 navigation trainer air-


Upon successful completion of the course, the graduate receives his or her navigator wings and is posted to one of three operational training units or OTU's; 404 Squadron in Greenwood, N.S. (OTU for the CP-140 Aurora), 406 Squadron in Shearwater, N.S. (OTU for CH-124 Sea King) or 426

Squadron in Trenton, N.S. (OTU for the C-130 Hercules). The OTU's provide the new navigator with the additional skills and knowledge required to fly as an effective crew member in a first operational tour. In the next edition, we will describe the Basic Flight at CFANS and its contribution to training navigators.

On the sports scene, the weekly student/staff Saturday night hockey games at Vimy Arena have begun. The two teams are now a mixture of students and instructors to prevent the students from suffering the weekly embarrassment of a sound thrashing. The pilots will now be able to train on the Dash 8 in preparation for the arrival of the first CT-142 Dash 8 scheduled for Oct 1990. The bad news is that the pilots will have to wait a little longer yet since the aircraft has gone into periodic inspection.

## A Coy, 2PPCLI at FallCon'89

"A" Coy deployed to FALL-CON '89 with 2 Platoons of 1-18, the 3rd consisting of personnel to assist with Coy Trg and the Live Fire Ranges.

After a short flight, yes flight, (the Airforce actually came through), we arrived at Wainwright to somewhat cooler temperatures. Everyone had visions of 2 feet of snow on the ground before we were to finish this exercise; however, this was not to be so as Fallcon '89 will be remembered as the exercise of the Indian Summer. With our feet firmly on the ground (in most cases) the first day was spent settling in.

Over the next few days APCs were turned over, cleaned up and made ready for "Battle". The 20th of September found the training Cadre in preparation for an individual Battle Skills Training Exercise scheduled for the following day. The idea behind this exercise was to refresh the individual soldier in basic skills.

The 22nd to 24th found Lt Rubisch and 2Lt MacKenzie off with their Platoons practicing drills and establishing SOP's at the Section and Platoon Level.

Individual Battle Shooting Ranges were the order of the day on the 25th. A section attack, a close quarter battle and a Grenade assault were run for the Coy. The men enjoyed the different ranges as they afforded a rare opportunity to hone those partic-

On the 26th the men were in Camp for Track Maintenance and some deserved rest, especially important as the Platoons were off for a demanding Airmobile Exercise the next day.

The exercise consisted of an Air Insertion followed by a raid and ambush of some local arms dealers. The Patrols were successful and the Wainwright area is once again safe from the local paramilitary presence thanks to

A few days later had the men firing the .50 Cal and 9mm pistol. There was no problem firing off the allotment of ammo as practically everyone was eagerly awaiting a second chance to fire

A couple of days of track maintenance, rest and a barbeque and "A" Coy was advancing to contact on KH 1 ran by Capt Bell and Cadre personnel. Four objectives over 1600M proved demanding for both soldier and commander. This was an excellent opportunity for Comds at all levels to see first hand how their men reacted with live rounds, objectives in depth and consolidation in preparation for the impending counter-

The final week of FallCon culminated in a series of live fire ranges. Upon leaving the Advance to Contact Range "A" Coy continued with the range round robin channeling their aggression in trench clearing, two very successful ambushes, Adv to contact 2, Woods clearing and trench clearing #2. The following is a blow by blow account of an attack on a Soviet trench system through the eyes of Lt. H. Rubisch.

#### **Trench Clearing**

"Dismount, dismount, dismount!", the excited order breaks over the radio and four Armoured Personnel Carriers (APC's) come to an abrupt halt. Machine gun fire rattles overhead as the troops take up preplanned and well rehearsed fire positions, engaging the enemy with a hail of deadly bullets. The "Whoosh" and "Crump" of an 84mm High Explosive Anti-tank (HEAT) round into a Soviet BMP signals the lead section to make its mad dash to the trench system. With luck and a well placed hand grenade, enough room is created for the section to be pushed forward. The rest of the Platoon is drawn into the trench system like a tail following the snake's head, and the dirty work of trench clearing begins.

It becomes a Section Commanders game as only two troops are fighting through at any given time. Orders must be obeyed to the word, executed with such speed and brutality that the enemy has no time to think or react.

There is much confusion in the trenches. Dust and clods of soil are kicked up by the numerous hand grenades used. Commands are screamed up and down the line, decisions have to be made, "Turn left! Turn right! No, leave it, we'll have to come back for it later." (but don't spread yourself too thin, you still have hundreds of meters to clear and you don't

want the enemy to appear behind you). Finally, you come to the end of the trench system. You have exploited and "rooted out" every last niche and hole in which the enemy could have hidden in. Now the Platoon Commander must quickly consolidate his position, fearing a counter-attack. Sections are assigned areas which they must watch and defend, and remaining ammunition is divided equally among the survivors (for that is what has kept him alive so far). Consolidation is finished and the wait begins.

# Fall Con'89 B Coy 2PPCLI

"And in the end, when the smoke had cleared, there standing on the objective was the infanteer."

Darkness was setting in quickly as each platoon moved into its jump-off point for operations into the backyard of the notorious 91st (the 91st Motor Rifle Regiment, that is). This was to be the beginning of a month long campaign for B Company, which would finally end gloriously in a small bush somewhere in that vast wasteland known as . . . Redland.

Each platoon having divided itself into several four or five man patrol dets, under the cover of darkness slipped across the forward edge of the battle area and into bandit country. Commended for his gallant reaction under fire, Pte Victor Desormeaux was awarded the close battle medal by his appreciative platoon commander. Desormeaux, having spotted three enemy trenches on the advance to contact range, ensured that the platoon commander was in no danger and then disregarded his own well being to singlehandedly close with and destroy the enemy.

On a sad note, 6 Platoon mourns the passing of Pte Tim Yakabowich's driving companion, Beetle Bailey, who died in a valiant counter attack by the 91st against 6 Platoon Trench Rats.

Four platoon's "Children of Fire" were given a 9 for their artistic illumination of the ambush site as they set ablaze several fires in the immediate area. Steven Spielberg, look out!

Finally, with the fires out, a hot shower and a good meal, B Coy returned to Kapyong Barracks with that warm fuzzy feeling of having completed a job well done.



## Royal Roads receives first coat of arms

anniversary of Royal Roads Military College (RRMC) and in celebration, the Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of the Canadian Forces, Her Excellency the Honourable Jeanne Sauvé, has granted the college its first coat of arms.

The presentation was made on Sept 12 as part of a special fall convocation for the conferring of degrees

Royal Roads was founded in 1940 and although originally intended for the navy, it has since become a tri-service military college. Its charter, granted by the government of British Columbia in 1975, authorizes it to confer academic degrees in the fields of physics, oceanography, applied military psychology, arts, history, political science and economics.

Truth, Duty, Valour

Royal Roads is the first military college to be granted arms by the commander-in-chief of the Canadian Forces, also acting in the capacity of head of the Canadian Heraldic Authority.

"Getting this coat of arms is a

Next year marks the 50th very important milestone for us," said Col. Claude Naud, commandant at RRMC. "Its presentation by the Governor General is particularly significant to the college as we enter the 50th year of the founding of this institution."

The arms represent the three elements of the military and since the college is located on the west coast of Canada, the colour blue represents the ocean. The cougar stands for the enterprising spirit and fortitude essential to a life of discipline and service. The motto identifies the college's vocation and lists the virtues of a soldier: truth, duty and valour.

"Those who have made these concepts a reality in the past have contributed to the survival and progress of nations," said Madame Sauvé. "It is not without reason that the Royal Roads Military College has made these qualities the goal of young people who wish to dedicate themselves to promoting peace."

**Honorary Degree** 

During the convocation ceremony, Madame Sauvé also received a special honour: a Doc-

tor of Laws (Honoris Causa). The honorary degree was conferred on the Governor General by Col. Naud in his capacity as vice chancellor of the college.

"We awarded Madame Sauvé this honorary degree to mark the end of her tour as Governor General and to honour her long association in advancing and promoting Canadian culture," explained Col. Naud.

**Masters Degrees Awarded** 

As well, master's degrees were conferred for the first time on three graduate students. Frank Moger, Stephen Newton and David Williams were all admitted to the degree of Master of Science. Currently, this two-year program is the only master's degree program available at

'Our master's program contributes significantly to filling the void and producing officers with that kind of qualification," said Col. Naud. He added that the program is the culmination of many vears of hard work by both professors and officers at the







## Preparing Your Vehicle for Winter

Once again the winter season is upon us. It is time to prepare your vehicle to get you safely through the trials and tribulations of winter. This is overwhelmingly important and is particularly emphasized by nature of the severe and bitter cold harshness of the Canadian Prairie winters, where temperatures and prevailing winds take their toll on many Canadian motorists left stranded by ill-prepared vehicles.

Helpful hints are to have your vehicle routinely serviced and tuned up at least twice yearly. Waiting until the last minute often proves to be, at best, a frigid inconvenience. Ensure all fluid levels are kept topped up; these include antifreeze, oil, power steering, brake, etc. Other hints are to have an emergency kit assembled in your car. Items

that should be found in the kit include a flashlight, at least two blankets (solar blankets are available at a minimal cost and are very compact). It is also wise to keep a couple of fresh candy bars in the kit, and one or two large slow-burning candles would be desirable as well. A complete and adequate survival kit can be put together for less than \$50.00 and could possibly be the difference in the outcome of a vehicle breakdown in extreme cold weather.

Don't forget that exhaust system! Have it checked for leaks and deterioration. Carbon monoxide poisoning claims many lives every winter by leaking into the passenger compartments of vehicles through faulty exhaust systems.

Have a safe and enjoyable winter season. Summer is just around the corner . . .
