## RAF OFFICERS VISIT WINNIPEG



Air Vice-Marshal Richard Ayling (on the right), of the Royal Air Force, has the historical significance of a NATO scroll on display at RCAF Training Command Headquarters in Winnipeg explained to him by the Chief of RCAF Training Command, Air Vice-Marshal C. H. Greenway.

AVM Ayling, who is the Senior Air Staff Officer in RAF Flying Training Command, was accompanied on his visit to Winnipeg by Air Commodore Robert Burns, the Senior Air Advisor with the British Defence Liaison Staff in Ottawa.

During their three-day visit to Winnipeg, which included a trip to RCAF Station Gimli, the visitors discussed the various aspects of training with their RCAF counterparts.

AVM Ayling departed by air for Britain on Wednesday. AC Burns returns to his post at Ottawa the same day.

## Senior RCAF Chaplain Promoted

Squadron Leader P. D. Ross, the senior Protestant chaplain in RCAF Training Command, has been promoted to the rank of Wing Commander.

W/C Ross, who is stationed at Winnipeg, is the Staff Officer Religious Administration for Training Command, and is responsible for the religious and spiritual welfare of Protestant personnel and their dependents in that Command.

Chaplain Ross was born in Winnipeg and received his education at the University of Saskatchewan, and St. Andrews Theological College at Saskatoon, being ordained to the ministry in 1941.

In 1942 after enlisting in the Air Force as an airman in the ground radar branch, W/C Ross served both in Canada and the Middle East theatre of operations, being released as a Flight Lieutenant in 1945.

From 1945 until his re-enlistment in 1950, W/C Ross was a pastor at several churches, including the Timothy Eaton Memorial Church in Toronto.

Chaplain Ross was the first Protestant chaplain to be transferred overseas to serve with the RCAF

W/C Ross is married to the former Sybil Thorne, who is the daughter of the late Dr. C. W. Thorne, of Saskatoon. The Ross's have three sons and two daughters.

Now that the football season is over we can concentrate on the curling wars. I understand there was a Grey Cup game, even though the West did not compete.

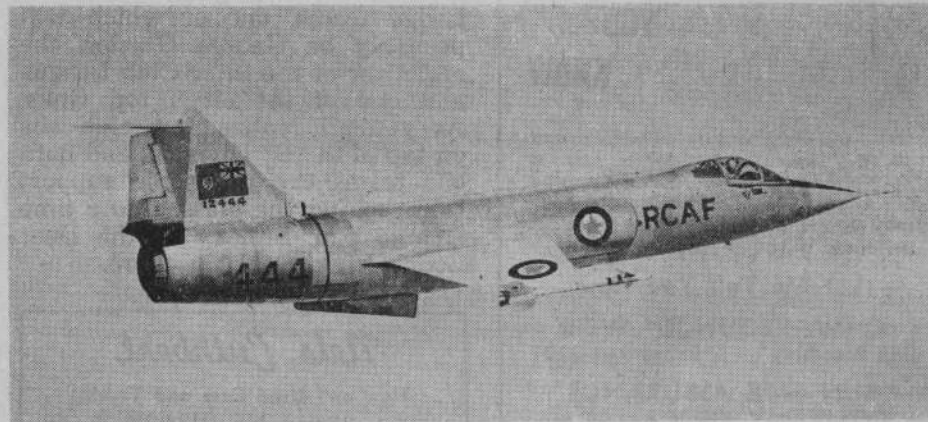

## SUPER STARFIGHTER



The fastest aircraft yet to serve in the RCAF, the CF-104 Super Starfighter is derived from the Lockheed F-104 Starfighter, popularly dubbed "a missile with a man in it." The airframe, built under licence by Canadair, is propelled by the Orenda-built J-79 turbojet engine to speeds up to 1,500 m.p.h.

In design and ancillary equipment the Super Starfighter incorporates several unique features, the most distinguishing of which is an extremely short and thin wing with a knife-sharp leading edge.

The CF-104, now in service with squadrons of the RCAF's Air Division in Europe, is a strike-reconnaissance version of the basic aircraft. It can accommodate a va-

riety of air-to-ground weapons and has a highly advanced fire-control, and the latest navigation and braking systems.

Nine world records have been broken by the Starfighter. It has held the speed record of 1,404.09 m.p.h. and the altitude record of 91,243 feet, both made in May 1958, and seven time-to-altitude records.

- Span—21' 11"
- Height—13' 6"
- Weight (max.)—28,900 lb.
- Speed—Mach 2 plus at 35,000 feet, or twice the speed of sound.
- Power—One J-79 turbojet developing 10,000 lb. of static thrust without afterburner and 15,800 lb. with afterburner.

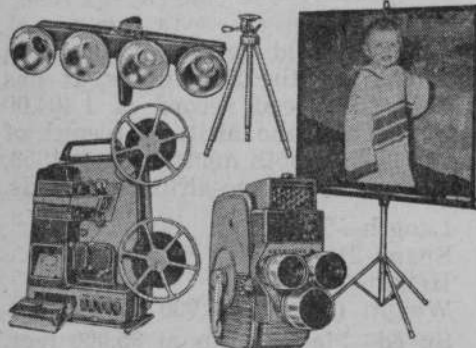

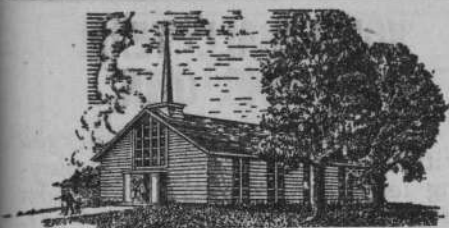

### RECIPE OF THE WEEK

#### CHOCOLATE DAD'S COOKIES

1 cup margarine

2 eggs

1 cup white flour

1 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. vanilla

1 tsp. cinnamon

¼ tsp. salt

4 heaping tablespoons cocoa

Blend margarine and sugar well.

Add eggs and beat. Sift flour, baking soda, cinnamon and salt and add to fist three ingredients. Add vanilla. Combine oatmeal and cocoa and add, mixing well. Drop teaspoons of batter onto greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for about 10 minutes. Makes a nice crunchy cookie that the kids will surely love. Nice to have on hand these days to distract the youngsters while you concentrate on your Christmas baking. This is one of Sybil Ross's recipes, so it's bound to be good. Hope you enjoy it.

Now, for those of you who enjoy fruit cake but just don't feel you want to spend all that money for such this year, here is a very good cake recipe which will serve as a fruit cake without straining your pocket book. This is Trudy Shannon's recipe for pound cake, and having used this myself, I can vouch for the excellence of flavour.

### POUND CAKE RECIPE

2 cups white sugar

½ lb. margarine

3 eggs

¾ cups flour

1 scant cup milk

1 tsp. baking powder

¼ tsp. salt

½ lb. raisins

½ lb. cherries

¼ lb. walnuts, chopped

Cream butter, add sugar and beat till fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beating after each addition. Add flour alternately with milk, reserving ¼ cup of the flour to dredge fruit. Add dredged fruit and mix well. Bake in 350 oven until done, which will be an hour and a half to 2 hours. When cake is cold, wrap in foil carefully and allow to ripen for about three weeks.

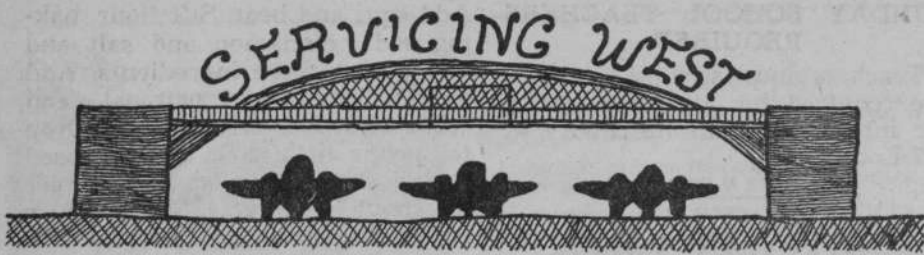

The gold florin of Florence, first issued in 1252, was copied in Germany in the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries in a coin called the gulden ("golden"). During this period the archbishops of Cologne and Mainz and the cities of Frankfurt am Main and Nuremberg seem to have issued most of the gulden. These coins are also known as Rheinische Goldgulden.

The silver coins struck at Joachimsthal in Bohemia about 1518-1525 acquired an enormous vogue. First known as "Joachimsthalers," the coins soon had their name shortened to "thalers".

Since the silver taler seems to have been just right as to size, weight and metal content, it was copied all over Europe and in the New World, where it became the Spanish dollar ("Piece of eight"). Much later, after the United States came into existence, the American Dollar followed the taler tradition.

Further to my previous predictions of our Canadian one and two-dollar current notes bearing the Beattie-Coyne signatures, these are very scarce today as you have probably observed. I've got my quota of each denomination and do not want any more.
